School Outing Regulations in the Secondary

SCOPE

1. These regulations apply to school trips and excursions which last one or more days.

A 'trip' is the term given to any outing of pupils accompanied by teachers outside School in order to carry out either pedagogical, cultural or social learning objectives as part of the curriculum, which is longer than one day and involves a temporary change of residence for participants.

An 'excursion' is the term given to any outing of pupils accompanied by teachers outside School in order to carry out either pedagogical, cultural or social learning objectives as part of the curriculum, which lasts one or more days.

PARTICIPATION

2. Participation in work done in preparation of the outing as well as participation in the entire outing is compulsory for all pupils, except for pupils with written authorization from the School's senior management given due to exceptional circumstances.

3. Before the outing, the School, the teacher in charge and the pupil will sign an agreement by which the rights and obligations of the parties are determined in accordance with these regulations.

In addition, parents/legal guardians must submit to the School's senior management a written statement that they accept to pay for the excursion for their child, including repatriation costs of the child for disciplinary reasons, as well as those of the teacher that accompanies her/him.

4. Parents/legal guardians must notify the teacher in charge of the outing of any medical condition their child has as well as informing her/him fully of any relevant treatment that must be followed. They must also ensure that the child is in possession of the required medication.

ORGANIZATION

5. The execution of School outings is the responsibility of the Schools. The principles of the general organization of outings will be set out by the Board of Education after consultation with teachers and parents.

6. Any financial difficulty of parents should not be an obstacle to the participation of their child in a School outing, which is compulsory. The School will seek to help organizers and parents find the financial means to participate in the outing.

Parents should be notified of the outing together with its costs in sufficient time to enable them to meet these costs. An evaluation of costs will be given as soon as possible.

7. The proposed outing is subject to the approval of the Director of the School.

8. All arrangements necessary for the outing will be executed by the School. The Director of the School will designate a teacher in charge for each outing.

9. The teacher in charge of the outing will be responsible for its organization and discipline and will stay in constant contact with the School's senior management to which s/he will report regularly. S/he will immediately report to management any serious breach of these regulations.

S/he is also required to notify the School's senior management of any event likely to burden the budget of the School, to hinder the progress of the outing, or to damage the reputation of the School, its pupils or its staff.

Except in an emergency, s/he cannot, without the consent of the School's senior management, make an agreement with any third parties from the host country that would increase the financial burden of the outing.

SUPPORT

10. Without prejudice to the application of laws and regulations which may be more demanding in the host country, pupils must be accompanied by teachers in a ratio of at least one teacher for every fifteen pupils.

DISCIPLINE

Important: If, as a consequence of a disciplinary council, a pupil is excluded from a school trip or excursion, the fees that have already been paid toward it will not be refunded.

11. The outing does not suspend the application of the School's discipline rules which, without prejudice to any necessary modifications because of the provisions listed below, continue to apply *mutadis mutandis* to pupils throughout the duration of the outing.

The following regulations will apply from the start of the outing.

12. Each pupil will ensure that throughout the outing they:

- behave in such a way as to ensure the health and safety of others participants as well as the reputation of the Schools, their pupils and staff.
- behave in a respectful manner towards the habits, customs, laws and regulations of the host country and to refrain from any act likely to offend the sensitivity of local people.

13. The consumption of tobacco and alcoholic drinks is prohibited.

14. Regulations regarding tobacco

However, provided that it is not prohibited by the host country's law or local regulations or likely to offend the sensibilities of local people, the teacher in charge may allow pupils aged sixteen years or over to smoke tobacco in moderation in places provided for that purpose according to the host country's law or local regulations, outside School activities, meals and rooms; smokers should be careful not to disturb other pupils by moving away from the group and by being as discrete as possible.

Important remark: The authorization for the above from the teacher in charge is a privilege not a right, and as such it may be withdrawn at any time and even withdrawn immediately if abused.

15. Regulations regarding RedBull type energy drinks

However, provided that it is not prohibited by the host country's law or local regulations or likely to offend the sensibilities of local people, the teacher in charge may allow pupils to consume energy drinks with moderation and only before 14.00.

16. The possession, custody, purchase, sale, exchange, free distribution, import, export and consumption of any commonly illegal drugs is forbidden, even when authorized by the host country's law or local regulations.

17. The possession, custody, purchase, sale, exchange, free distribution, import and export of any sharp, barbed, or blunt object which can be used as a weapon is forbidden even when authorized by the host country's law or local regulations.

18. Sexual relations are forbidden.

19. All acts likely to undermine the person or property of pupils or third parties are prohibited.

20. After consultation with other teachers, the teacher in charge may organize free-time, adapted to the pupils' age, the outing's location and other relevant circumstances to ensure pupil safety and respect for the area and local customs. Parents are advised of the possibility of free-time being organized. They must authorize in writing the participation of their child in this activity. Without it, the pupil will remain with the teacher. The pupil will be covered by insurance during the time he is accompanied by the teacher as well as during free-time provided he/she abides by the regulations as formulated in article 12.

During free-time, pupils are required to travel in groups of at least three and each one must carry: her/his identity papers, other documents required by the host country's law or local regulations, a copy of the teacher in charge or another teacher's mobile phone number, the complete address and telephone number of the accommodation, as well as means to return there (e.g. a transport ticket).

If free-time occurs after dark, the teacher in charge will arrange a fixed time to return to the accommodation. Parents are advised of the possibility of free-time being organized after dark.

During free-time the teacher in charge or his/her delegate must be constantly contactable by phone.

21. It is forbidden at night for pupils to leave the group's accommodation when not free and in a manner not prescribed by the teacher in charge.

SUPERVISION

22. Supervision will be carried out by all teachers under the direction and authority of the teacher in charge.

This supervisory power means that there is a possibility that the teacher in charge may carry out investigations in the rooms and belongings of pupils if there is a reliable, accurate and consistent serious breach of these regulations.

The teacher will make all necessary arrangements for the safety of students and will immediately notify the parents or tutors in case of problem.

23. Pupils must obey the instructions of the teacher in charge and other teachers in order to comply with these regulations.

SANCTIONS

24. Violations of these regulations may be punished by the teacher in charge, after consultation with other teachers and hearing the pupil's defense.

Without prejudice to disciplinary action which may be undertaken if necessary after the return of the group, the teacher in charge may exclude the pupil from all or part of her/his free-time or activities;

In the event of serious infringement (drug or alcohol use, unlawful conduct, etc.) and without prejudice to judicial procedures in the host country, disciplinary action will systematically be convened when returning from the outing to determine sanctions.

25. In case of serious violation of these regulations, the teacher in charge will immediately notify the senior management of the School and in consultation with it and other teachers and after hearing the pupil's defense, may decide on her/his immediate repatriation.

The pupil repatriated will be accompanied by a teacher, at the expense of the parent/legal guardian. The return of the teacher to the outing will also be at the expense of the parent/legal guardian.

Irrefutable violation of Articles 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 21 of these regulations are considered to be serious enough to justify the automatic repatriation of a pupil.

Other infringements of these regulations may be considered as serious, either by reason of special circumstances or their repetition, if there have been enough warnings.
